

Well, what a night!

We had some really great performances and some quite emotional ones. I feel it to be a total privilege to have been part of something so good which has lasted for 10 years.

Needless to say that this was a team effort, no more so than in the final few days and final few hours. To those who asked about the weather I always said ahead of the show it was going to be OK. However, I awoke early on the Thursday morning tormented by the weather forecasts and by 2.30 in the morning had concluded we had to have a roof to the stage.

At 7.45 I was doing emails to the team about a roof and it was John Whyte who located and sourced a cover 12m by 8m by 10am, ordered by noon and delivered the next day.

It was mid morning Thursday when I got Dave to use his silver tongue and persuade Shillingford, the Scaffolders, to come back with cross beams. 2 1/2 hours later they were on site and left us with the skeleton of the roof.

Meanwhile the team got on with fitting out the stage. There was a great sense of purpose and camaraderie and the whole thing, whilst hard work, was great fun.

On Friday, eventually, the cover arrived and we tried getting it in place in the teeth of a gale. After many ingenious solutions the roof was on and tied down, although flapping somewhat.

The electrics went in and the lights and the stage dressed with rope lights and banners.

Normally on a Saturday morning I am banned from the Rec but in a persistent rainstorm I saw genius at work at as the saggy roof, full of water, was persuaded to dump its contents on a minute by minute basis.

I arrived at 2pm to do the sound checks and the sun came out. Fantastic, and we were away starting on the preparations for another show

The audience reaction to the show was exactly what we had been seeking, and the underlying principle of Astonbury held good. We were giving local people the opportunity to perform to the best of their ability to an audience size they could only dream about.







Village Orchard

We are very pleased with the enthusiasm shown by villagers for the orchard. The first order for fruit trees has been made and subsequent orders will be placed up to and including the likely dates for the first planting of trees. Dependent on the state of the soil this will be on weekends around 'Apple Day' on 21st October.

The first tree, a 'Stewkley Red' plum, will be planted by Christine Scott. If you would like to be present when the tree you have donated is planted then please contact Peter Knight—he will be happy for your assistance in preparing the place for the tree.

To date we have approximately 60 trees to plant so it's likely planting will be spread over two weekends. Further details will be in next month's Chronicle.

It is not proposed to allow any free standing plaques or memorials in the orchard, but rather that names or words of memorial be included in the detailed record mentioned.

If you would like to donate a tree, for planting this year, then please contact either Peter Knight, John Hardcastle or Gordon Smith as soon as possible or put a note through Peter's door at 59 The Green, and we will try to get your tree included in the October week-ends of planting. A number of people have asked for more than one tree and we feel it appropriate to let each household order two trees if they wish. In future years this restriction can be reconsidered.

Marker posts have been placed to delineate the avenues of trees - please take the time to see the site of your Village Orchard - we are confident it will be a great asset to the village.

Vic Scott Orchard Tree sponsor form

We would be grateful if those who have offered to sponsor a tree could complete and return this form, with their cheque made out to 'The Vic Scott Orchard', to Peter Knight at 59 The Green.

We shall keep a record in the form of a book that we hope to have easily available. This will contain a 'map' of the orchard, to help with identification and finding trees that have been individually sponsored; a photographic record; and whatever words sponsors might like to include in the record. Some villagers have said that they would like to consider 'their' tree as a form of memorial, and this would be a good place to express that. We would like to put the variety of the tree and the name of the sponsor. Beyond that, it is entirely up to sponsors what they wish to put; we suggest up to a limit of about 150 words. To make sure that we have these words correctly, would you please put below or on a separate sheet what you would like to say.

In addition, we think that sponsors might like to have a record in the orchard itself, in the form of tags on the actual trees – this is optional. The tags used will come from Bradenham Hall (we have a sample if you would like to see one). They cost £2.50 each: these will need to be bought in bulk, which we will do. They will have a small fixing hole and the date of planting. Apart from that there is room for four lines, each of which can have 25 letters or spaces. We would like the first line to be the variety of the tree; after that you have 3 lines, so for example:

VIC SCOTT'S DIARIES September 1954

The weather

A continuance of the cool, wet weather that has been pretty general throughout the summer, but with a few more bright sunny days. Winds often very strong and gusty, mainly of a westerly direction throughout most of the month.

Bird Life

Most of the summer visitors left early this year; the last Common Whitethroats seen during the first week of the month, and the Spotted Flycatchers and Willow warblers departing by the 20th. On the 24th the Chiffchaff was heard for the last time; whilst in the evenings the increasing numbers of starlings passing over in flocks on their way to their communal roost show that winter is fast approaching.

Insect Life

Despite the cold, wet summer, wasps have been very common this year and have been a considerable nuisance in the gardens and orchards. Butterflies and most species of moths have been scarce, even more so than last year, though the small tortoiseshell has again been very common, and the comma and both the peacock and red admiral have appeared in fair numbers.

Mammals

Throughout the month myxomatosis continued to spread slowly, affecting approximately half the parish by the end of the month. Estimated death rate among rabbits in area of initial outbreak 99%.

Bike ride

My son Dan and I are doing a big (for us) bike ride in September. It's the C2C (sea to sea), 130 miles or so from Whitehaven/Lake District across the Pennines to Tynemouth. We've talked about doing this for ages and we are finally committed – raising money for ACE Africa, a charity helping rural communities in Kenya and Tanzania living with AIDs and HIV, caring for orphans, vulnerable children and their families. 



ALLOTMENT DIARY

I am happy to say that the rumours I spread about the decease of my fuschia bush were greatly exaggerated; it has now burst into life, and is flowering as well as ever - although there is a large amount of dead wood, which I am mow cutting out. (I understand from older and wiser gardeners that it is very common for a fuschias to look dead in the spring: they produce leaves later than many other plants. I was clearly expecting the worst after the freezing weather in the last winter, and made a wrong assumption).

During the other spell of unusual weather we had - the drought in April and May - there were dire predictions in the press about the effect this would have on crops later on in the year, and it was asserted that, amongst other crops, potatoes were going to suffer, and would not recover from their being deprived of water during this vital part of their growing cycle. I am pleased to say that so far as I can tell from my own crops, the potato harvest has not suffered at all: most of the varieties of potato that I have dug up so far have produced excellent crops - indeed one variety, a new species called Vivaldi, has produced an outstanding number of large and unblemished tubers. I have still to dig up my main-crop potatoes, but certainly so far there is no need to panic and expect the price of potatoes to go through the roof later this year.

Indeed, so far this has been a good year for almost everything: the best ever year for summer fruiting raspberries; my apple trees are laden; the sweetcorn crop is doing very well, and beans and peas were both up to scratch. The courgette plants are still producing courgettes faster than I can eat them. The only disappointments have been my Victoria plums and black currants. I had thought that perhaps the plum blossom had been attacked by a late frost, but April, who lives next door to me has a very large crop of Victorias; and I now think that the problem is that I had an enormous crop of plums last year, and the tree is now taking a year to recuperate, which I have read plum trees are inclined to do. However, my greengage tree has performed well, and my only problem there was picking the gages as soon as they were ripe, before the wasps could eat them.

Meanwhile, in the greenhouse I have had a glut of cucumbers, and am still having a glut of tomatoes. And, for the first year ever (after several years trying), I have succeeded in growing some aubergines. I have found that the trick is to grow the plants in pots, rather than planting them directly into the soil. I reckon that this has two benefits: first it increases the amount of water that remains around the roots; and secondly the soil in the pots remains warmer, since it is surrounded by the warm air in the greenhouse.

I mentioned in my last article that I was visiting relations in the French Alps, where the allotments had, the last time I visited, been attacked by a marauding wild boar, that had dug up all the potatoes. I found that this problem had not reoccurred, but that they had a new difficulty with which to contend. One of the allotment holders there insists on growing nothing but potatoes on his allotment. As you will know, the books all tell you that you need to grow different crops each year, since that way you don't have the same chemicals being taken out of the soil, and the same nutrients being put into it. If you don't do this, the crop you get from whichever plant you are growing gets progressively smaller. Not only is this happening on this French allotment (which of course only affects the grower himself), but worse, his potatoes have been attacked by some disease, which because of his growing the same crop year after year, is remaining in the soil, and this is now affecting all the other allotments around. The stupid allotment holder is refusing to accept that he is to blame. As a result, my relations' French friends who have allotments, have had to stop growing potatoes! I hope your gardens and allotments are doing as well as mine, and that those of you who are entering the longest runner bean competition are having success in growing beans. I think my plant has peaked too early: I already have beans more that a foot long, but I think they'll all be gone by the day of the judging.

Fostering with a difference

(or can you look after our bitch)

At Hearing Dogs for Deaf People, we have our own breeding scheme for dogs that will be trained to transform the life of a person with impaired hearing. To do this, we rely on fosterers to care for our brood bitches.



These are people who volunteer to

take a brood bitch into their home on a full time basis. Hearing Dogs provide support and advice to fosterers regarding the care, socialising and training of the dogs as well as in their specific role as a brood bitch. Our many years experience has shown us that typically breeds such as Labradors, Retrievers, Spaniels, Poodles (and crosses such as Labradoodles) as well as some smaller breeds such as Cavaliers make ideal hearing dogs.

Most of our dogs, those destined to train as hearing dogs as well as those selected for the breeding scheme will have gone through our twelve month 'Puppy Socialising Scheme' where they are taught how to behave in a variety of social situations. Brood bitch fosterers will continue this training and development by attending Kennel Club Good Citizen Classes at our High Wycombe Training Centre.

Brood bitch fosterers home whelp their bitch and care for the puppies until they are eight weeks old. Support from our Dog Breeding Department is always available over the phone and our staff make regular home visits throughout the process. A member of the Dog Breeding Department will attend the whelping and conduct follow up visits at regular intervals until the puppies are brought to the centre at eight weeks.

Fosterers will also attend the Centre to drop off and pick up their dog when required for mating and assessment. Attendance at Hearing Dogs official vet in Aylesbury and other health specialists will be needed on a regular basis to ensure the bitch remains a suitable candidate for our breeding scheme. Routine vaccinations and treatment can be administered by the Fosterer's local vet.

Volunteer fosterers need to live within 1½ hours drive of our Centre at High Wycombe and access to a car is necessary. Preferably full time home based, fosterers should have access to a garden and a home suitable for a dog.

Hearing Dogs for Deaf People pay all expenses of fostering as well as providing expert help and support whenever needed.

Well, do have it in you to foster a bitch? Go ahead, make our day!

Countryside Matters - September

This week I was watching the contractors taking the second cut silage from the Ascott Farms, the first field along the Leighton Road and the small field behind the wood just past my farm. In both cases the fields are now too small for the vast modern machinery used in arable farming; therefore these small pockets of land are let out for grass keep, to a local sheep and beef farmer.

I ster that day I was talking to an arable farmer from Buckingham and be told me he had used his

Later that day I was talking to an arable farmer from Buckingham and he told me he had used his new combine to direct cut his oil seed rape, having a 40ft header on this monster. Once up and down the field was the equivalent to three trips with his old machine, well that just about sums it up, doesn't it. That is why, as a teenager, I remember Ascott Farms having at least 25 plus men on the Estate, including the three dairy herds and now they farm more than double that acreage with only three full time staff and harvest students but no dairy herds.

Whilst pondering these fascinating thoughts!, I noticed 10 red kites foraging for small rodents and worms on the freshly cut grass on a field not more than 12 acres, some were high on the thermals hitching a lift and watching for movement and others diving into the grass stubble for their prey. At least four were juveniles born this year. Why is nature either feast or famine? What started out as a successful release programme of these birds in the Hughenden valley shall locally turn out to be over population? Is it time for a capture and release programme, to help re introduction further afield before they start inbreeding and picking up disease and struggle to find food, they already find themselves in conflict with the buzzards over their territory. It doesn't help when people leave food out for them, cooked food being the worst variety, instead of these birds foraging further a field.

What terrible news that Mark and Julie have decided to put the lease up for sale on the only village pub left in Wingrave, thank God we still have that and our lovely shop and garage. If you moan about the price of a rural bag of sugar, rural pint of beer and a rural gallon of petrol all of a sudden there is nothing left to whinge about, they will have all gone.



Aston Abbotts Parish Council Annual Parish Council Meeting

Wednesday 22nd June 2011

Present: - Cllrs. P Shorrock (Chair), C Higgs, Mrs K Curry, J Perkins, Carvey and P Bruton (Clerk). County Councillor N Glover was in attendance.

Apologies were received from Cllrs. Mrs J Hardcastle, Mr. R Clarke and District Councillor P Cooper.

Correspondence to note — The Clerk advised he had received a leaflet regarding Theatre in the Villages, after discussion it was noted that Cllr Curry would review the productions in more details to see whether we had a suitable venue and contact Councillors as appropriate.

County and District Council matters - County Councillor Mrs N Glover advised the meeting that the Area 12 speed limit would go ahead as planned while Area 13 will be delayed until the next financial year. The Wing Local Area Forum had voted to send a message to the leader of the Council objecting to the delay, as Aston Abbotts was in Area12 there should be no direct impact on our Parish.

Following a question from Councillor Carvey County Councillor Glover explained, although the senior positions within the cabinet of County Council were being held by mainly Councillors representing South Bucks, she did not envisage this would effect the direction of funding within the County.

Transport for Bucks, have recently launched a new free mobile application that will give up to date information on road works, gritters and pothole

Planning

11/00694/APP (Norduck Farm, Moat Lane - Kinsale Agriculture)

Change of use of part of agriculturally building to egg packing facilities and insertion of first floor (retrospective)

The application was discussed in the light of the evidence of the facility being in operation without the relevant consent, in particular the type and frequency of vehicular movements contradicted the application detail.

It was resolved to **OPPOSE** the application on the following grounds.

The application contravened AVDC General policy GP.21 in relation to the adequacy of the highway network to support such an industrial activity. Additionally the original consent conditions had not been complied with in relation to the construction of passing bays and waiting areas causing considerable danger to other access road users and horse riders on the only bridleway in the Village. Neighbouhood Plan – The meeting discussed whether the Parish required a Neighbourhood Plan and it was AGREED that Council should complete the process. The Planning sub committee would take responsibility for completion reporting back to Council on a regular basis. An initial meeting date was agreed with the objective of agreeing an outline timetable and appraisal of the Consultation process.

Village Plan – Cllr Perkins reported that the final consultation document was complete and it was AGREED that the document would be hand delivered to residents by Councillors and distribution responsibilities were allocated.

Local Area Forum – Councillor Curry reported that at the recent meeting there had been concern that the funding for Phase 2 of the footpath was no longer required, however this was clarified and it was noted that the initial costing was £45k, this was being reviewed and was expected to come down.

Other matters of interest raised included the news that Wing and Ivinghoe libraries were to become community run, the construction of the Waitrose supermarket would commence in June. During the discussion the matter of overgrown hedgerows was raised and County Councillor Glover advised she would investigate what actions were available to Council to address our

ASTON ABBOTTS BOOK CLUB

Sam Crawley has moved away from the village and the Book Club. We wish her every happiness in her new French home. If you would like to come along to a Book Club meeting you would be very welcome. (Are there any men who would like to join?)

Our July meet was held at John Hardcastle's house to discuss 'Three Cups of Tea' by Greg Mortenson and David Oliver Relin. The book charts the life and exceptional dedication of Greg Mortenson to bring education to the remote villages of Pakistan and Afghanistan. He has built in excess of 50 schools at the time the Taliban rose to power. In his acknowledgements he says 'It is my vision that we all will dedicate the next decade to achieve universal literacy and education for all children, especially for girls. More than 145 million of the world's children are deprived of education due to poverty, exploitation, slavery, gender discrimination, religious extremism, and corrupt governments. May *Three Cups of Tea* be a catalyst to bring the gift of literacy to each of those children who deserves a chance to go to school'.

The book was quite dry and failed somewhat to paint a picture of the true difficulties that Greg Mortenson had to cope with. There was concern also at his relationship with his wife and family that seemed at odds with his concern for others. An interesting book - there is a children's version as well. *John Hardcastle*

The August meet was held at Kate Curry's house to discuss 'Room' by Emma Donaghue. The story is told through the eyes of Jack, who is five years old and lives with his Ma in 'Room', which has a locked door and a skylight, and measures eleven feet by eleven feet. The only things he knows to be real are himself, Ma and the things in 'Room' – until the day when everything changes for them both... Most of us agreed that although at first this book promised to be a traumatic and horrific read, it actually turned out to be a gripping account of the emotional roller-coaster that was Jack's life. Emma Donoghue's clever use of language managed to portray life through the limited vocabulary of a five year old child, while at the same time giving the reader an insight into what was really taking place in Ma's life. Almost everyone had enjoyed the read, and it certainly provoked quite a lengthy discussion.



- c. The best cheat Scoring will be based on ingenuity and artistry
- Major Tim Peacocke & Mr Andy ('Carefree') Shillingford have once again 3. Judging 'volunteered' to judge all three categories of the competition. Their decisions will be final!!
- 4. The Trophy This will be awarded for the longest bean and it was felt that it should become known as the 'Ray Wilkinson Memorial' Trophy.. Andy Bystra has been asked to design and make a suitable trophy which will be retained by the winner for 12 months.



CHURCH CLOCK

Once again, it's been amazing how many people have commented on the fact that our church clock has stopped; not just residents either!

Any way, thanks to the internet, sourcing a replacement suspension spring for the pendulum wasn't too difficult, particularly since the original manufacturers back in 1889, Gillett & Co. are still in business, albeit as Gillett & Johnson. Fortunately they were prepared to make another, using the broken one as a pattern which Colin Higgs generously paid for.

After a couple of weeks the new spring arrived and was fitted to the 'refurbished' pendulum. The next problem was how to refit all of this to the clock, bearing in mind it's entire weight of some 115 lbs (most of which was the cast iron 'bob' weight) had to be supported on the new spring who's thickness is little more than that of a beer can!


A fixture was made to support the 'bob' and the pendulum arm 'threaded' through it before being suspended on the clock's frame and connected to the escapement impulse lever. With everything nicely lined up, the weight of the 'bob' was slowly taken up by tightening the adjusting nut at the base of the pendulum. After a few adjustments it worked fine, and at the time of writing (mid Aug.) is keeping time quite well. The hours are being struck correctly but we're having some difficulty is persuading the chimes to work as they should; not the fault of the clock, just our failure to understand how to set it up correctly!!



Astonbury X - a Performer's View

There are some events which took place in 2011 that will leave a lasting impression on the memory. The Japanese Fukushima earthquake and tsunami, William and Catherine at the spectacular Royal Wedding, Rory McIlroy's disasterous final round at the US Masters and his subsequent triumph at the US Open, and, of course, Astonbury X.

We have indeed come a long way. When Neil Chesher first said 10 years or so ago that he wanted to hold an outdoor concert, we all wondered whether it was indeed possible, but did even he envisage it would grow into what was achieved this year? It all started in Ann and Dickie's back garden with a sloping stage borrowed from the Church Room, the village disco kit, and a light or two for when it got dark. By contrast, this year's stage set would not have been out of place at the doyen of music festivals, Glastonbury.

The reaction of the bands on seeing the stage for the first time said it all. There was only one word to describe this - "WOW". We were talking 10 metres wide by 8 deep decorated with our familiar orange banners, stacks of speakers either side, integral drum stage sporting a fantastic electronic kit, lights, did we have lights!! the carpeted floor littered with fold-back speakers, a mixing desk bigger than a pool table (and that was just for the on-stage sound) and a roof. Yes, we had a roof which kept out the driving rain during Saturday morning as the equipment was being set up. The weather that morning was so bad that my golfing friends gave up after 9 holes. But our massive tarpaulin made the stage dry warm and cosy.

Someone above smiled on us, knowing that rescheduling was not an option and the rain stopped around lunch time. This meant that sound checks could proceed throughout the early afternoon amidst the burgeoning gazebo city.

And so on to the show. The crowd filed in excitedly, undeterred by the earlier inclement weather and set about tackling their picnics. At 7:00 precisely the show started with the striking chords of Fanfare for the Common Man, the Emerson, Lake and Palmer version of course, performed by Nigel and Ant Palmer. This was swiftly followed by a new group to Astonbury, the Alpha Males with their drummer, Ant who entertained us with some improvised jazz fusion, the talent of these musicians shining through brightly.

Pat Daniels asked after 'anyone who had a heart' whilst Lynne Manning 'didn't want to talk about it'. Two sterling performances punctuated by the admirable Dennis Band. Simon Longman then warmed us up with Delilah and suddenly it was time for the world famous Chunkies (Neil, John, Bob and Nigel) to take the stage. Was it my imagination or were we actually singing in tune? We rationed the audience to five well rehearsed numbers (if the number of empty bottles of red wine from rehearsal nights are anything to go by), which included a special appearance from Hannah Brandon. My particular favourite was the highly appropriate 'I can see clearly now the rain has gone' complete with harmonies.

But there was much more to come. Nigel Meddelman left the sound desk to entertain us in style wearing that eye-catching white suit. Tony Rees gave us Sweet Home Alabama and Rebel Yell in that unique gravelly voice. Hayley Wilkinson gave us yet another professional performance, the true emotion of the occasion showing through. Simon Gresswell flew us to the moon which was by now in view. Then yet another treat, which you can now relive on Youtube - Simon Longman and Ian Roberts had put together a band especially for the night. The energy that went into this performance captivated the audience and belied the fact that they had apparently rehearsed only once as a group.

Rachel Sutton gave us a fabulous solo performance with some recent covers including Adele looking to the left and the right. A new band to Astonbury INCC rose to the occasion singing amongst other numbers 'We are the champions' and 'Johnny be good'. This was quality stuff from a seven piece band based in Leighton Buzzard that plays together very regularly. They had phoned in the morning quite expecting the show to have been cancelled and it was clear that the stage set and quality of the sound was well beyond their expectations. Our last band was the familiar Spokes who gave us 'Sex on Fire' and a song with somewhat doubtful lyrics about a bar that would not have been out of place on Little Britain. By now the rain was falling but that didn't dampen the spirits of the audience.

Sadly the show had to end somewhere and it was now well past the projected 11:00 close. Time to bring the Chunkees back on stage for their final farewell with Abba's 'Thank you for the Music'. We will never forget the audience reaction to ten great years with our number one fan singing his heart out right at the front. We all feel proud to have been part of such a great event, brought together by the great generosity of many and the hard work of many others.

County Councillor N Glover was in attendance.

Apologies were received from Cllr. J Perkins and District Councillor P Cooper.

Correspondence to note – The Clerk reported that we had received a letter from AVDC regarding a consultation on the validation of planning applications and planning lists, the document could be viewed via the planning portal on their website. We had also received a note from the Local Government Boundary Commission advising of an Electoral review of Buckinghamshire – draft recommendations. Comments on the report were requested by the 10 October 2011. The recommendations could be viewed at www.lgbce.org.uk. The Clerk would scan the letter and circulate to members and a Notice had been placed in the Parish Notice Board.

County Council and Police matters - County Councillor N Glover outlined a summary of current topics that included an update on the Speed limit review, BCC asset transfer policy where the aim is to empower local people to deliver community services which best meet their needs. Examples of this initiative were the Community led Wing Library and the Wing Youth Club that was targeting the age range 11yrs to 19yrs, hoping to start in September and this may be of interest to youngster in Aston Abbotts. The problem of Fly tipping was mentioned and residents should be encouraged to report the offender to the witness hotline on 0845 330 1856 after taking a note of the Registration no if possible.

County Councillor Glover also advised that her understanding was that a planning application for a testing mast for the possible erection of Wind Turbines in an area between Wing and the A418 in the vicinity of Cotteshaw Farm although at this stage the precise location could not be confirmed. The testing process can take up to 18 months to conclude, but we should be aware of the impending applications, it was unlikely the application for the testing equipment would be refused.

PCSO Paula Boston reported to the meeting that there was nothing in the way of crime to report in respect of Aston Abbotts for the last 2 months, however although things had been quiet it was important that residents continued to report any issues, concerns or things that do not look right as recent experience had shown that crime could be solved and prevented by this method. In answer to question from the floor regarding parking on the pavement and obstructing the way of pedestrians Ms Boston advised that residents should call in the issue to the Hot Line number (0845 8505 505) as this will ensure the matter is logged and action will be taken to address the matter. A further question on whether bbq's were considered a fire in public spaces was discussed and it was advised that local bye laws would enable notices by the owners to specify that bbq's could not be lit in the relevant area.

Neighbouhood Plan – Clir Carvey updated the meeting on progress to date. A consultation presentation to include refreshments for attendees was planned for the 12th and


Dave fumed quietly for a week over this vicious slur. "Old guys!!!" Who does this punk think he is???
