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VIC SCOTT'S DIARY

February 1947

Birds: Very large flocks of fieldfares and redwings during long spell of severe weather. Continuous severe frost and snow made food for most birds very hard to find. Several dead Mistle-thrushes found, also Robin, Song-thrushes and Starlings.

Points worth special notice:

Hungry rook, very tame, only a couple of yards from house door. Moorhens driven from ponds by frost to find food in hedgerows at considerable distance from water. Little – owl in garden in daylight.

An unusual sight during the very cold weather was six species of one family of birds all feeding together in quite an 'ordinary sized' holly tree (feeding on berries). They were:- Mistle-thrush (4) Song-thrush (3) Blackbird (2) Fieldfare (about a dozen) Redwing (2) and Robin (1). No wild flowers in bloom during the month, development retarded by severe weather.

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Aston Abbotts Parish Council Parish Council Meeting

Wednesday 18th January 2012

Present: -

Cllrs. P Shorrock (Chair), C Higgs, Mrs K Curry, B Carvey, Mrs J Hardcastle, R Clarke, J Perkins and P Bruton (Clerk). County Councillor N Glover, District Councillor P Cooper and sx members of the public were in attendance.

Correspondence to note – The Clerk updated the meeting on correspondence received and the following matters were discussed.

Bierton and Broughton had issued details of the results of their response to the recent AVDC Forward Plans consultation and a copy of the report could be viewed at www.biertonvillage.org.uk

A rural services survey had been received from Community Impact Bucks and it was AGREED that the Clerk would respond on behalf of the Parish.

County Councillor N Glover gave a summary of her report for the month and the following points were noted:- The work on the edging out of the pathways and various kerbstones had been assigned to the BCC Community Gang although their scheduled work was often disrupted by emergency pothole repairs. The County was continuing to oppose the HS2 rail link and were currently considering the best course of action.

District Councillor P Cooper advised the meeting of an initiative being promoted by Community Impact Bucks. for coordinated heating oil supplies that can help to reduce the cost by people coming together to form a group with orders being channelled through one individual, details were available from the Parish Clerk and had been published in last month's Chronicle.

The New Home bonus scheme that was being introduced following the Localism Bill introduced by Central government was discussed and it was noted that this year's money had already been allocated by AVDC. There had been some concerns expressed by Councils at the way this was being handled by AVDC and a consultation would take place shortly to decide how it will work and what will influence the distribution of the money up to 2014, after that it was not clear and further details were required from Central Government. It was noted that the £2.4m received this year had mainly been allocated to fund the upgrade to waste services to include a relocation of the base to a new depot.

The application for a new Wind Farm at Stewkley had been received with the sites at Wing – Cublington and Ford looking increasingly likely that applications would be received in the near future. AVDC were still looking to introduce a Policy to cover such applications and had started the process with the results expected within the next 3 to 5 months.

Village Plan – Cllr Perkins reported that the Action Plan required for the completion of the plan had been finalised as a result of the recent village consultation. A meeting would be arranged with Sarah Allwood and the VP committee to finalise the document and make arrangements for publication.

Litter Blitz - The litter blitz was scheduled for 31st March 2012.

Meetings with event organisers – It was noted that a form of letter to issue to event organisers had been agreed. As a result, as and when Council were approached for use of their facilities the appropriate form would be issued.

Queen's Jubilee – The details of the proposed village celebrations were distributed to Council along with the results of a door to door consultation. The detailed proposals were discussed and given the level of support from residents indicated by the results of the survey it was RESOLVED to allocate a maximum of £900 towards the cost of the events. The Clerk would confirm whether our insurance cover was able to cover the event.

Hedgerow Maintenance – There was concern that the hedgerows in the village were not being maintained by owners and were a health and safety risk to walkers and in particular road users. Cllr Clarke expressed concern over the action being taken in respect of the overgrown hedge by the Royal Oak, however it was noted that this matter had been an on-going concern for some time and other Councillors felt the current state of the hedgerow in question posed an accident risk on an already hazardous bend. The Clerk would write to the owners requesting they take the appropriate steps to rectify the situation, with the exception of the Royal Oak as this is being handled by BCC direct.

LAF Meetings – Cllr Curry advised that we had received a note to advise the Local Area Forum organisers were planning to refresh the priorities discussed at these meetings. As a result we were being asked to prioritise the 15 items identified in relation to our village. It was AGREED that Cllr Curry would circulate the document to Councillors for their views and then prepare a best fit response.

Street Name Plates – The Clerk noted the name plates that required attention and would notify the relevant department at BCC.

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Street Light Maintenance – It was RESOLVED to accept the proposed annual maintenance contract.

Vale of Aylesbury Plan – It was AGREED that the Clerk would respond to the consultation in respect of the Vale of Aylesbury Plan by referring to the conclusions of the recent Neighbourhood plan exercise.

Planning application - 11/02823/APP (77 The Green, Mr A S Rashid)

First floor side extension and conversion, alterations and extension to existing outbuilding to form annexe. The above application was discussed and it was noted this was an additional application to recent application no 11/02060/APP. After consideration it was RESOLVED to oppose the application. The property was in the conservation area and the size of the proposed alterations were out of character with the surrounding properties as well as having an impact on the neighbouring properties. The Clerk would refer to the Inspectorate's report on previous applications and also request that in the event the application is successful a condition is applied restricting future development.

Old School, Cublington Road – The Clerk reported he had received a response from AVDC advising that an officer from planning had visited the site and confirmed that the materials being used are considered to be acceptable and so the case will be closed accordingly.

Norduck Farm – Passing bay – The Clerk reported he had received a letter from AVDC attaching minor amended plans that addressed the concerns raised regarding the siting of the passing bay and that they were now satisfied the bay is in the right location and of sufficient width and it is intended that the application proceeds to determination

Recreation Ground Safety Check: Cllr Clarke delivered the monthly safety check report and there was nothing significant to highlight. He was addressing the concern over the condition of the pole on the multiplay equipment. The Shed doors appear to have been broken a Cllr Shorrock would investigate.

Annual Safety Check report review—Cllr Clarke reported he was still following up on a few questions he had from the report and would report more fully at the next meeting on any actions that were required.

Picnic Benches—Cllr Clarke reported that we now had no benches as one was obsolete and the other damaged beyond repair. It was RESOLVED to give Cllr Clarke authority to purchase replacement benches of suitable standard.

Precept and Parish reserves – The recent precept discussions had focused Councillors attention on the needs and future requirements of residents. As a result it was felt that Council should look at any ideas for improving the facilities in the village environment. Examples were discussed and it was AGREED we should ask residents for their ideas for additional facilities that they believe would enhance the village. Councillors would talk to residents and we should also review the Village plan for previously identified actions. The Clerk to include an item under the heading Parish Spending review on next month's agenda.

It was confirmed that the next Parish Council meeting will be held on Wednesday 22nd February 2012 at 7:30pm in the Church Room.

ASTON ABBOTTS AND CUBLINGTON LADIES CLUB

The Ladies Club met in the Church Room on Thursday 19th January and were delighted to welcome several new members. Our speaker, Neil Rees, was well known to us as he has spoken at the Club a couple of times before. His talk was entitled "King Zog of Albania". Having never heard of King Zog I was somewhat intrigued and admit that I felt it didn't sound very exciting. However it was absolutely marvelous. Neil is a great speaker and makes his talks very interesting and funny. He held our attention fully for an hour.

Ahmet Zogu was a business man who decide he would like to be a politician when the first elections were held in Albania in 1921 and after only a year he was made Prime Minister. In 1925 Albania was declared a Republic and Ahmet Zogu was made President and only three years later Parliament decided Albania needed a King and Ahmet Zogu was chosen on 1st September 1928. As Neil commented "what a CV"! He was the only Muslim European King and decided he would be known as King Zog. We heard how the family travelled all around Europe to find somewhere safe during the war and there were many interesting anecdotes but one of the most fascinating things was to hear that King Zogs wife, Geraldine, who was Hungarian is a relative of our Princess Michael of Kent whom Neil had met and chatted with about the Royal family of Albania. When King Zog died his son acceded the throne and Neil recently interviewed him and became great friends with his son, King Zog's grandson.

This only a snippet of the talk but it does just give you a flavour of the afternoon that we had with Neil.

The next meeting is on Thursday 16th February and we are having a talk by a Mouth and Foot Artist. Do come along and join us.



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
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Village Orchard

There was an excellent turn out for the meeting in the Church Room on 10th January; 50+ villagers came along to listen to Peter explain where we are at and to express their views on future plans for the Village Orchard.

Approximately 85 trees have been planted. The Village Orchard bank account currently holds £548.53 - this money will be used to replenish trees that fail to progress and will fund the ongoing management of the orchard. There are around 57 spaces left with the possibility of establishing two further rows if demand exceeds the current plan. Peter explained that it is not the intention to fill the orchard in one or two seasons but to allow trees to be planted over the years to come. The assembly expressed their thanks to Peter for all his hard work with generous applause. Peter had earlier thanked Maggie Smith for the

donation of a shed. He thanked Les Smith for a hard days work. He



thanked John and Pam Dixon who have been indefatigable in their help and advice. He also thanked Alex for the long hours she has devoted to preparing all the paperwork, ordering and collating. He thanked Gordon for his care and attention in organising the 'record book' that is hoped will be kept in the Church.

Wendy Bentley has kindly agreed to co-ordinate the village events that will be planned for the orchard in the future - these may centre around blossom and harvest time etc.

There were many points of detail discussed. It was agreed that we limit any mention of the orchard in the press or the internet. It may be possible to arrange villagers' access to our Aston Abbotts website so that villagers can view the orchard records.

It was suggested that it would be useful to have a water main installed. After discussion it was agreed that this was not really necessary as once the trees were established then no further watering would be required and the cost of the main would be a burden on the future expense of running the orchard. It was explained that no pruning of trees would be carried out unless it was necessary to remove diseased timbers. Christine Scott explained that Vic never pruned trees as a general rule.

As regards the current maintenance of the orchard Peter indicated that he was happy to be responsible for mowing and general care. An area will be trialled to judge whether it is practical to establish wild flowers. Any seats or benches installed in the orchard will need to be placed so as not to interfere with the mowing regime.

Any requests for further planting will now be dealt with at the end of this year and will be notified in the Chronicle at the appropriate time.

At the latest meeting, Peter Knight said that the management plan for our orchard is basically one of minimal intervention. There are other possible strategies. Here is a description taken from a short story written by Chekhov ('The Black Monk', 1896) of what can be done given enough will power, and serf power. The first part describes an ornamental orchard, the second a commercial orchard. We are thinking of starting a rota for those wishing to tend fires all night to protect our trees against frost. Gordon Smith

'There was no end to the whimsy, refined disfigurement, and mockery of nature to be found here! There were espaliered fruit trees, such as a pear tree in the form of a pyramidal poplar, there were spherical oaks and lime trees, an apple tree shaped like an umbrella, as well as trees in the form of arches, monograms, candelabra, and even a plum tree shaped into the number 1862, which was the year Pesotsky took up horticulture. Then there were beautiful slim saplings with trunks as strong and as straight as palm trees, and it was only when you examined them closely that you could see they were actually gooseberries or blackcurrants. But the most cheerful aspect of the garden was the constant activity. From early morning until dusk there were people with wheelbarrows, hoes, and watering cans bustling about like ants around the trees and bushes, and in the paths and flower beds ...'

'At supper all they could talk about was the morning frost, and it was decided that Tanya would stay up; at one o'clock she would go into the garden to check that everything was all right, and Yegor Semyonich would get up at three or even earlier. Kovrin sat with Tanya all evening and then set off with her after midnight into the garden. It was cold. In the main orchard, the commercial orchard as it was called, which brought in several thousands a year in pure profit, a thick, black acrid smoke had spread out along the ground and enveloped the trees, thus saving all those thousands from the frost. ... Kovrin and Tanya walked along the rows, where there were bonfires of manure, straw and bits of rubbish smouldering, and occasionally they met gardeners wandering about in the smoke like shadows. Only the cherry trees, plum trees, and a few sorts of apple tree were in blossom, but the whole orchard was drowning in smoke ...'



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
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ASTON ABBOTTS BOOK CLUB

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
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ALLOTMENT DIARY

Oh Hell! Is it that time already? The e-mail from the editor: "... the deadline for the February Chronicle is next Friday"! What to write about? Activity on the allotments has been almost non-existent. I've picked some leeks, the last of the red cabbages and some Brussells sprouts. (The cabbages and the individual sprouts were generally very small this year. I wonder why? My incompetence as a gardener, or the effect of the strange weather we had in 2011? Must talk to fellow allotmenteers, to see how they fared). Oh, yes, and I cut down the canes of my autumn raspberries -(curiously one does not do the same to summer raspberries. Don't know why) - and then had a bonfire of these together with the remains of the sweet-corn stems, and some woody debris which I carted to the allotment from my own garden, to help the bonfire to go.

I visited Peter Knight a few days ago to find out from him what was the source of a plethora of roots that were crisscrossing the land covered by my fruit cage at home, and what to do about an escaped garden plant which was growing like a weed there. He managed to depress me on both counts. The roots were from an adjacent greengage tree, and there is nothing I can do about them unless I cut the tree down. The weed-like plant is a trefoil, which scatters lots of tiny seeds from each little yellow flower (of which there are hundreds), and the only way one can get rid of them is to keep weed-killing the plant in the spring or summer with a spray of Round-up or something similar – which is pretty difficult without also killing all the strawberries among which it is growing! Temporarily moving the strawberries out. and covering the land with black polythene as I had done, has probably been totally ineffective.

Like all of us, I had heard of the Bermuda Triangle, but until a week or so ago, I'd never heard of the "Pink Triangle". This is not, as you may have supposed, an area of the world where people of a particular sexual preference congregate, but the area around Wakefield, Leeds and Bradford - and is so called because of the forced rhubarb crop that is grown there. For some reason lost in the mists of time it is here that specialist rhubarb growers started growing forced rhubarb, grown in dark sheds to produce stems of a delicate pink colour, which are much sweeter than normal rhubarb. It apparently enjoys special protected status from the European Commission, putting it on a par with champagne and Parma ham.

One-carrot wedding ring found 16 years on

woman pulled up a carrot in her garden and found her lost wedding ring wedged around it. Lena Pahlsson

She and her husband Ola, left, are just happy to have it back.


"We're keeping it in a safe place," she told a local newspaper.

This rhubarb was in such demand before the war that a special "pink express" train was run nightly from Wakefield to London during the season to deliver the crop. It has not yet regained this exalted status, but is now enjoying renewed popularity among top chefs.

Rhubarb originates from Siberia, and its roots need sharp frosts for healthy growth. To produce forced rhubarb, the plants need to be grown outdoors for over 2 years - preferably with cold frosty winters - before they are transferred to sheds lit only by candlelight, which forces the rhubarb to grow. It then grows so fast that it can sometimes make a popping sound as the stalks burst forth from their buds. The 2010-2011 winter was very good for the crop: last winter has been a disaster. However, enough forced rhubarb has been reserved for the annual rhubarb festival which is held in Wakefield at the end of February.

I am also attaching another news item which caught my eye, from the Times at the beginning of the month. I am not sure whether the moral is not to keep pet sheep; or that gardening sometimes produces unexpected benefits!

Finally, a thought for the month: the gardener Bob Flowerdew was once asked when was the best time to take cuttings. His answer cannot be improved upon: the best time to take cuttings, he said, is when no-one is looking! Peter Shorrock





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
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DATES FOR YOUR DIARY

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


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


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The Oldest DJ In The World by James Perkins

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
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
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
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Annual Parochial Church Meeting Tuesday 24 April 2012.

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Anyone living in the parish is very welcome to come along to the annual meeting of St James's Church. There are two separate meetings to the evening: Firstly;-

- the 'annual vestry meeting' to elect two churchwardens (currently April Curnow and Caroline Abel Smith);
- the annual parochial church council meeting

The second meeting will follow immediately at around 8pm and covers:

- * Changes in the church electoral roll (which is being revised in March). If you are a regular churchgoer aged 16 or over and not on the roll, this is the time to have your name added
- Annual report on parochial church council activities and the parish generally
- Financial statement for 2011
- Report on fabric of the church buildings
- · Report on the Deanery Synod
- Election of six parochial representatives to the PCC
- Other matters of parochial or general church interest

Notices of both meetings will be posted in April at the church; information about the electoral roll will be posted in March.

Community News

Cheaper Heating Oil, you may have seen on BBC's local news that the Oxfordshire scheme is being rolled out in other counties. As reported in Community News last month this facility is available now to heating oil users in Aston Abbotts. This scheme is available to individuals, commercial users (that's farms, schools, businesses) and groups of individuals, all are eligible to join the scheme. In January 2012, Community Impact Bucks launched the community bulk buying scheme for the whole of Buckinghamshire (so tell your friends). See the AA website or call 0845 3890389 for more information.

New Homes Bonus Scheme, although not directly affecting AA at this time some of you who see more widely what is going on in Buckinghamshire may have picked up an interesting article from the Aylesbury Vale Association of Local Councils (AVALC) and in the Bucks Herald (24 Jan) about AVDC's "highjacking", as it is referred to, of moneys under this scheme. There is an AVDC response to this on the AA website for those interested in the subject.

Luton Airport are proposing to apply to increase the number of passengers per annum from 10.5 million to 18 million, this will inevitably lead to more "stacking" and flights in general passing over.

Health and Well Being, Buckinghamshire residents will soon be asked for their thoughts on plans to improve their health and well-being. In January the newly formed Shadow Health & Wellbeing Board (SHWB) will put their strategy out for public consultation. It will set out some key areas for action and a vision for Bucks over the next 3-5 years. It will become the key document spanning health, public health and social care on which future services will be based. The new system will bring together the clinical expertise and local knowledge and understanding of the needs of patients and the public to help inform the plans for meeting local needs.

The Board will be looking for the views of Buckinghamshire residents and stakeholder groups, including those involved in housing and education, as these can be major factors in improving the health and well-being of individuals.

The consultation will start towards the end of January and continue to the end of March. It will be available online through the Council's website www.buckscc.go.uk. or by email to betterhealthcareinbucks@buckinghamshire.nhs.uk.

Shrove Tuesday, also known as Pancake Day in Britain, is the day before Ash Wednesday and the start of Lent-'Shrove' stems from old English word 'shrive', meaning 'confess all sins'. It is called Pancake Day because it is the day traditionally for eating pancakes as pancake recipes were a way to use up any stocks of milk, butter and eggs which were forbidden during the abstinence of Lent.

Making pancakes is quick and easy, make sure you make plenty, they are always very popular.

The end of 2011/beginning of 2012 was a novel experience for Joy and I – the first time either of us had spent time in the ringing chamber of a Church bell tower: it was great, truly magical. Seeing in the new year by candle light, with mince pies, mulled wine and the majestic power of the bells!

Bunt Scott, the Tower Captain at Stewkley, had graciously invited us a few days earlier to their 'traditional' celebration. I was brought up in a Naval town (Chatham, Kent) and we greeted the new year with ships' sirens, naval guns and a few fireworks, and it was all big and spectacular. This year's celebration was smaller in comparison, but absolutely appropriate for rural Buckinghamshire.

Celebrations are really important and key to many events in our lives – a life well-lived, good exam results, marking a new relationship or a new life, and they are key also in our faith. Soon, we will be approaching Ash Wednesday (22nd February) and Lent, leading to Good Friday and Easter; the other major Christian festival alongside Christmas, but fundamentally more important in the story of God's dealings with our deeply-flawed humanity. If we ever needed proof of that last statement, we don't need to know the Bible or be a theologist, just read the daily papers and watch the TV news. What a sorry bunch we can be! But at the same time, isn't it great to meet people who really light up the World with their kindness and positive attitude, and we've met many individuals like that since moving to this area - Aston Abbotts, Cublington, Soulbury and Stewkley – Thank You!

Ash Wednesday is the day after Shrove Tuesday, which often features various carnival or Mardi Gras celebrations in many countries. Ash Wednesday has some variations across cultures. For example, some children in Iceland go from door to door and sing songs for treats on the day. Traditionally, they would try to attach small bags of ashes or stones to the back of people's clothing. Many people in countries where Ash Wednesday is a holiday may spend the day at home with family and friends or catch up on sleep. Some people attend Ash Wednesday church services. Many Christians believe that Ash Wednesday is a day of penitence or repentance for one's past wrongdoings. Ash Wednesday church services usually include priests marking individuals with previously blessed ashes on their forehead in form of the cross. The concept of Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, is observed on a Monday in countries such as Cyprus and Greece. This is because many eastern churches do not generally observe Ash Wednesday but they observe Ash Monday (also known as Clean Monday or Green Monday) in its place. Many people observe a fast that includes avoiding meat, eggs, dairy products and animal or vegetable oils.




