




VIC SCOTT'S DIARIES - MAY

During the first week of May I found a certain moorhen's nest, containing three eggs, among growing reeds about six feet from the water's edge. Round the edge of the water near the nest was a trimmed thorn hedge, through which I had to squeeze in order to get a close view of the nest. About the time that the eggs were due to hatch my friend and I squeezed through the hedge to look at the nest, and the sitting bird left the nest as usual. But instead of scuttling away into hiding the bird swam to a distance of about ten feet from the nest, and proceeded to swim backwards and forwards anxiously. Suddenly the bird dropped its tail into the water and cried out as if being hurt, at the same time trying to lift literally out of the water by beating with its wings in a seemingly weak manner. My first thought was that a pike had caught the bird by its legs but to my knowledge this water contained no pike. Then the other bird, hearing the cries of its mate came swimming towards the nest, and when it approached near its mate, started to behave in exactly the same manner. Only then did I realize that the birds were trying their hardest to attract our attentions from the nest, and their strange behaviour achieved its purpose.

VILLAGE ORCHARD

We are very fortunate to have had some rain at last so that we have not had to water the orchard since the hose-pipe ban.

I do however expect to have to water regularly during the 'high summer' as there is no reserve of water deep in the soil. To that end I am pleased to report that we have found a legal way to fill our little bowser.

Please remember that there are buckets in the shed and hopefully there will be water in the tank solely for the orchard. So - water your favourite tree (especially F1 Ed) every time you make a visit.


One piece of very exciting news (I am getting old, rather boring and perhaps desperate for excitement) - a really splendid wild cowslip plant has appeared in the orchard. It would have had 9 flowers on it had not a rabbit eaten off 5 of them. The plant has now been wired over in the hope that it will set and spread seed.

In between showers the turf heaps have been moved - some by official means, some by the phantom sod shifter of Aston Abbotts. A good job done!

The trees look well, some very well; and I reckon that 22 trees bear blossom. One shouldn't really let trees fruit in their first year - they should put all their energy into growing - particularly roots. Should some fruit appear it will be tempting to let one fruit set on a successful tree. Just think - your tree could bear the first fruit in the Village Orchard in Jubilee Year - what fame! (as long as it's not that Wotton Costard!).

So - here's hoping for plenty of rain in May with warm sunshine between the showers - Or - as Gordon tends to say these days, "Hail Wasail"

The cowslip is declining. In the past this flower was picked for May Day celebrations, dug up for gardens and harvested to make cowslip wine and herbal medicines. Cowslips declined dramatically between the 1940s and 1980s because of the intensification of agriculture which increased use of herbicides and chemical fertilizers and brought about the ploughing of old grasslands. Today cowslip meadows are a great rarity and cowslips survive mainly on roadside verges and nature reserves.

ASTON ABBOTT BOOK CLUB

The April meet was held at Gaynor Erskine-Walker's house to discuss "The House by the Dvina" by Eugenie Fraser. The Dvina is a river flowing into the White Sea at Archangel. This is an account of a the author's childhood spent in Russia in the period immediately before the complete change to their society following the First World War and the overthrow of the Tsar. Its a childhood also spent in part in Scotland. The contrast from a life of privilege to one of hunger and deprivation is revealing. We all picked out of this book some memorable events - it created a lot of discussion.

Arkhangelsk's economy revived at the end of the 19th century when a railway to Moscow was completed and timber became a major export. The city resisted Bolshevik rule from 1918 to 1920 and was a stronghold of the anti-Bolshevik White Army supported by the military intervention of British-led Entente forces along an Allied expedition, including a North American contingent known as the Polar Bear Expedition.

During both world wars, Arkhangelsk was a major port of entry for Allied aid. During World War II, the city became known in the West as one of the two main destinations (along with Murmansk) of the Arctic Convoys bringing supplies to assist the Russians who were cut off from their normal supply lines. During Operation Barbarossa, the German invasion of the Soviet Union in 1941, Archangelsk was one of two cities (the other being Astrakhan) selected to mark the envisaged eastern limit of Nazi control. The military operation was to be halted at this A-A line, but never reached it in reality as the German forces failed to capture either of the two cities as well as Moscow.



Parish Council Meeting

Wednesday 4th April 2012

Present: -

Cllrs. C Higgs (Chair), Mrs K Curry, B Carvey, Mrs J Hardcastle, R Clarke and P Bruton (Clerk). County Cllr. Mrs N Glover, District Cllr. P Cooper and one member of the public were in attendance.

Correspondence to note – The Clerk updated the meeting on correspondence received and the following matters were discussed.

We had received an invitation to participate in the 2012 Best Kept Village Competition and after discussion it was AGREED that we would not enter this year.

We had received a letter from Aylesbury Vale Association of Local Councils outlining the support and services they provided to Parish Councils in Aylesbury Vale. The Association receives no funding for any of its activities and was requesting a voluntary contribution from all members of £10. Clir Carvey had declared his interest in this item and other Councillors discussed the request and RESOLVED to make a contribution of £10.

Annual Parish Meeting – 9th May 2012: The draft agenda was amended to include an update on the Neighbourhood Plan and it was noted that as the Clerk was away Cllr Carvey had kindly offered to take the minutes.

Wind Turbines – Following the note received from the Clerk to Cublington Parish Council an article had been included in the recent issue of The Chronicle. At this time no responses from residents had been received. However it was AGREED that we should respond to Cublington asking to be kept up to date with developments and should there be any Public meetings on the issue then we would be interested in attending. County Councillor N Glover updated the meeting on the current Highways issues in the village and then gave a summary of her monthly report that included the launching of a Car sharing scheme, the Luton Airport application, Awareness of domestic violence and e-books for free from the Library. Further details are available on the County and District websites.

District Councillor Peter Cooper updated the meeting on the following matters: the District offices were in the process of moving to Gatehouse Way, apart from the Customer Service Centre and it was noted that the Cash Office was closing down at the end of August, cash payments could still be made at Post offices. The development by the Theatre is under way and scheduled for completion by the end of the year, Car park charges were changing and further details are on the AVDC website as well as the local press. Finally there followed a discussion on the current planning situation following the Government's issuing of the National Planning Policy Framework. AVDC are still working on developing their Local Plan and given the current concerns over the definition of sustainable development provided for in the Government's NPP it was felt that our Parish should continue working on developing a Neighbourhood Plan that provides for a planning policy that is in accordance with the wishes of residents.

Village Plan – Cllr Perkins had circulated the first draft of the Village Plan and there were some concerns that previously agreed amendments had not been included. The Clerk would request that Cllr Shorrock sends through the Licence to the organisers and he will check with our insurers that they are comfortable with the arrangements.

Wingrave Crossroads Bus Shelter – We had received a note from Wingrave Parish Council regarding repairs to the Bus Shelter that had originally been donated by Ex-president Benes of Czechoslovakia. It was AGREED that we should meet with representatives of Wingrave Parish Council to ascertain the extent of repair being proposed.


Neighbourhood Plan – Cllr Carvey and the Clerk had attended a recent meeting on the current position on AVDC's planning policy. The indicative date given for completion of their Local Plan was 2014 and it was apparent that Parish Councils that were currently developing Neighbourhood Plans were waiting on AVDC before being able to proceed. We were being asked to have further meetings to move our plan forward, however after discussion it was AGREED that we should wait and see what comes out over the next 3 to 4 months and then seek guidance when the situation becomes clearer. Damaged Gate - Lines Hill - It was RESOLVED that Cllr Clarke approach Mr Knight to repair the Gate.

It was confirmed that the next Parish Council meeting will be held on Wednesday 23rd May 2012 at 7:30pm in the Church Room.



From our local PCSO Team - Crime Statistics: Crime is down this month compared with the same dates last year with 25 crimes of note during March compared with 41 last year. AVDC Waste Services have now set an implementation date for the start of the new, improved refuse and recycling service. The new collection regime will start on Tuesday 4 September 2012. Every household will receive a letter this summer to tell them if their collection day has changed.

New recycling bins will be delivered to households during July & August, in preparation for the changeover. They will be delivered with an information pack, which will explain what goes in each of the bins, and a collection calendar, so people know which bin to put out when.





NOT ON THE ALLOTMENT DIARY



I always used to wonder why, when he wanted to build up his strength, Pop-eye's food of choice was spinach. It always seemed a perverse choice, knowing the dislike that much of the population has for this rather bitter member of the brassica family. However, I read an article recently which suggested a reason for this. In the late 1800's, a German scientist called Dr. Emil von Wolff claimed that it contained 10 times more iron than it does, due to an error in his calculations. His theories held sway for many years, and even though the mistake was

eventually discovered, this myth continued to be believed by many, even into the 20th Century, and it is probable that it was this that influenced Pop-eye's creator.

Another item of allotment related news which I read recently was that a solicitor and accomplished clarinettist named Paul Johnson has taken on the historic and long-forgotten role of the Pershore plum charmer. Basically Mr. Johnson plays music to the plums to encourage them to ripen. He said that "Deep Purple" had a dramatic effect on purple Pershore plums; while Marjorie Seedlings seemed to enjoy "On the Sunny Side of the Street", and to blush at "Bring me Sunshine".

Mr. Johnson suggested that he wanted people "to stare at their plums while playing the radio or listening to their favourite tracks, and to note down their immediate observations, and any changes to the plums the following day".

Quite why this news has broken now, when plum trees are not yet anywhere near being in fruit, I have no idea; but at least I am giving you the chance to try the theory out as your plums ripen later this year.

The snow which fell in parts of the country in early April caused one journalist to write a piece which I found fascinating. Back in 1908 a blizzard swept across England on 25th April, with snow-drifts of up to 2 feet in Berkshire; and in Oxford 18 inches of snow were recorded – the heaviest snowfall in the city during the 20th Century. Greenhouses across southern England collapsed under the weight of snow, telegraph poles were brought down; and horse-drawn sleighs were used to haul supplies to cut-off villages.

On the same day the FA Cup Final between Wolverhampton Wanderers and Newcastle United was played at Crystal Palace, then in Surrey. A Newcastle supporter, Gladstone Adams drove from Newcastle to the match in his car, a remarkable adventure in those days. During his journey a storm erupted, during which sleet and heavy snow showers lashed the car, and Mr. Adams struggled to see where he was going, because of the snow and ice which stuck to his windscreen. He frequently had to stop to wipe the glass clean; and finally had to fold the screen flat, and face the elements without any protection!

The ordeal of this journey was so awful that it gave Mr. Adams the idea for inventing a device to clear the windscreen – and so came up with the windscreen wiper. Mr. Adams patented his invention in 1911, and the first working model is now on display in a museum in Newcastle.

The asparagus crop is having a strange season. The warm weather in March meant that some growers were able to start harvesting their crops at the end of March, the earliest recorded start to the season. However, the cold weather that occurred in April has now delayed the ripening of the crop, and some growers are having to harvest later than usual. At the date I am writing this (21st April), my own plants are just beginning to push up shoots, and I shall be enjoying the first spears tonight.

Meanwhile – to include some allotment news - , my son, Adam, has rotavated my allotment, and under my supervision has planted the first crops, including first early and second early potatoes: and our sweet-corn crop is flourishing in the greenhouse. I am hoping that I shall be fit to deal with the necessary weeding when it becomes needed: weeding is not Adam's idea of a good time!




